NOTICE OF DRAFT INTERIM REMOVAL MEASURE WORKPLAN AND 30-DAY PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD FOR THE ASCEN LANDFILL SITE, HUNTINGTON BEACH

What Is Being Proposed?

A proposed interim cleanup plan to remove and dispose, or, if feasible, recycle tarry and oily waste at the Ascen Landfill site is available for public review and comment. The proposed interim cleanup plan, called a draft Interim Removal Measure (IRM) Workplan was developed specifically for the 38-acre site located at the southwest corner of Magnolia Street and Hamilton Avenue in Huntington Beach. The draft IRM describes previous investigations, investigation results, and proposed interim cleanup plans. Under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), a draft Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) has been prepared because the proposed removal activities will not have an adverse environmental impact. The Ascen Landfill site poses no immediate health risk to the public because there are no offsite exposures to site contaminants. However, the Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) determined there are chemicals present from past operations at the site that are above DTSC's protective standards. The draft IRM is an interim measure and is not the final cleanup remedy for the site. DTSC requires an overall cleanup plan be developed and implemented for the entire site to ensure long-term public health and safety.

From 1938 to 1984 the site operated as a permitted landfill. Industrial and oil field wastes were disposed at the landfill from 1938 to 1971. After 1971, construction debris was disposed at the landfill until it was closed in 1984. The site contains various types of liquid and solid waste in buried pits, surface piles of concrete, rebar, and other construction debris and open and buried lagoons (ponds). There are five visible lagoons (referred to as Lagoons 1 through 5) covering about 30% of the site, one covered pit (Pit F), and seven former pits that are no longer visible (three in the northwest corner and four in the southeast corner of the site). To further investigate the nature and extent of contamination at the site, DTSC is proposing the removal of tarry and oily waste from the site as an interim removal measure. This interim removal will also help determine an appropriate long-term site-wide cleanup.

This notice provides the public an opportunity to learn more about the site and submit public comments on the draft IRM Workplan and draft MND. The 30-day public comment period begins **October 22, and ends November 23, 2009**.
