**RE: RESULTS OF UPDATED CULTURAL RESOURCES RECORDS SEARCH AND NATIVE AMERICAN CONSULTATION**

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PCR Services Corporation (PCR) conducted an updated cultural resources records search for the project through the South Central Coastal Information Center at California State University, Fullerton on June 5, 2013. The purpose of this records search was to identify any newly identified cultural resources or studies within the project site or half-mile radius that may have been recorded or conducted, respectively, since the original cultural resources records search that was conducted on December 8, 2008.

Results of the updated record search indicate that no newly identified cultural resources are located within the project site. One new built environment resource, P-30-176946, has been identified within a half-mile of the project site since the original records search in 2008. P-30-176946 is described as three fuel oil tanks that hold fuel oil for the Huntington Beach Generating Station. They stand 40-feet high and have a maximum capacity of 262,000 gallons (Daly 2009). P-30-176946 will not be impacted by the proposed project since it is located far enough away to be impacted by construction and operation of the proposed project.

Three new cultural resources studies have been conducted within a half-mile of the project site since 2008. However, none of these studies addressed any portion of the project site.

PCR also submitted updated letters to the eleven (11) Native American groups recommended by the Native American Heritage Commission as being affiliated with the project site to solicit any new comments or concerns regarding the proposed project since PCR submitted the original letters in 2008. PCR has received no response from the Native American groups to date. The request letters can be found attached to this memorandum.
